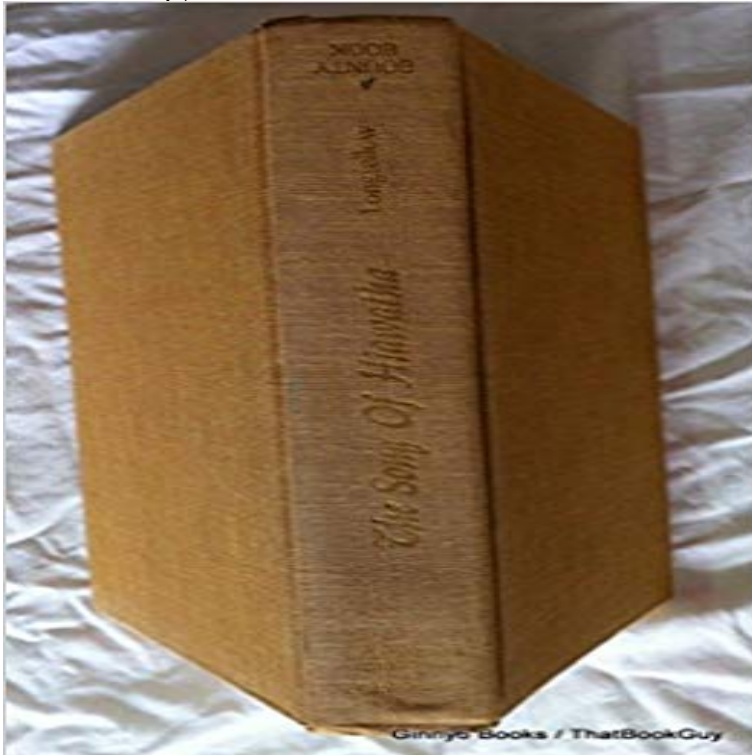


The song of Hiawatha
